

## Dealing with academic journal copyright agreements

Before a paper is published the lead author will receive a copyright agreement from the publisher which they must complete and return. In the UK, copyright in related works belongs to a person's employer<sup>1</sup> and copyright must be licensed or assigned by Rothamsted to the publisher to allow them to publish the work of Rothamsted employees.

### Co-author permissions

The lead author is responsible for ensuring that the copyright agreement terms are adhered to, including where this relates to undertakings by the co-authors.

The lead author must ensure that:

1. If the co-authors are Rothamsted employees<sup>2</sup>, they must read and understand the terms of the publisher's agreement.
2. If the co-authors are Rothamsted students or Visiting Workers ("VW") they must have assigned intellectual property ("IP") to Rothamsted to be treated as employees as in 1 above.
3. If co-authors are not Rothamsted employees or are students or VW who haven't assigned IP to Rothamsted, they need to provide confirmation to the lead author of their employer's acceptance of the terms of the publisher's agreement.

To obtain agreement from co-authors under category 3 above, where copyright doesn't belong to Rothamsted (external colleagues or students or VW who haven't assigned IP to Rothamsted), the lead author should ask their co-authors to provide the following suggested text by email, inserting the relevant wording as appropriate:

*"As co-author of the article [*article provisional title*] and any unique identifier], I confirm that Rothamsted Research Ltd may enter into the copyright agreement with [*publishers name*] to support publication in [*journal title*] on my behalf"*

For a publisher's agreement that is an exclusive **licence** agreement, a print out of the email returned by the co-author including the above text should be kept on file by the lead author.

For a publisher's agreement that is an **assignment** of copyright, the co-author must send the Rothamsted lead author a letter or print out of their email reply which has been signed by the copyright holder.

## Dealing with any images, illustrations or other copyright material in the article

If the article includes images, illustrations or figures for which Rothamsted is the copyright holder, then ownership of these materials needs to be retained by Rothamsted and not be transferred to the publisher. Any such Rothamsted owned material needs to be declared to the publisher on the publisher's copyright form. The applicable copyright licence for such Rothamsted owned material is as follows:

- **If the paper is to be published with 'Gold' (i.e. paid for) Open Access:**

The image can be published under the same Creative Commons licence that is applied to the rest of the paper i.e. the Creative Commons Attribution licence, **CC-BY licence**. There is no need for the author to specify a different CC licence for images in the paper.

Scope of this licence:

User must give appropriate credit, provide a link to the licence, and indicate if changes were made. User may make reasonable changes, but not in any way that suggests that Rothamsted endorses the use or user.

- **If the paper is to be published with 'Green' (i.e. where no payment is involved) Open Access or in other non-open access journals:**

The image can be published under the Creative Commons Attribution-Non -No Derivatives 4.0 International license, abbreviated as:

**CC BY-NC-ND 4.0** (<https://creativecommons.org/licenses/by-nc-nd/4.0/legalcode>).

Scope of this licence:

**Attribution** — User must give appropriate credit, provide a link to the licence, and indicate if changes were made. User may make reasonable changes, but not in any way that suggests that Rothamsted endorses the use or user.

**Non Commercial** — User may not publish the material for commercial purposes.

**No Derivatives** —User may not distribute any modified material i.e. an image that has been remixed, transformed or built upon.

- **If the publisher requires written/electronic permissions for any Rothamsted owned images that have been used in the paper:**

We have an [Image Access Policy](#), which deals with external use of Rothamsted owned images and provides for the sharing of these images for educational and research purposes under a Creative Commons licence. The lead author can send the publisher a copy of the policy (also available on the internet at <http://www.rothamsted.ac.uk/disclaimer>). as confirmation of Rothamsted's permission to use Rothamsted images and illustrations in the publication. ## Who can sign-off the publisher's form?

Once the publisher's form has been completed with any Rothamsted owned images declared and confirmation from co-authors obtained then copyright agreement needs to be signed off on behalf of the copyright holder, Rothamsted. **Lead authors have the authority to do this on behalf of Rothamsted.**
